Our Heads of Department also play a key role in ensuring students remain engaged with learning and assessment while working through the restorative process in the CPR Room.

Over the next week and into Term Four, our Year 8 students will begin the process of selecting their electives for 2026. This is an important step in shaping their future learning pathways. At the same time, students will also have the opportunity to apply for Junior Secondary Captain and House Captain leadership positions. These roles provide valuable experiences in student leadership and school service, and we encourage all interested students to consider applying.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every August, all schools across Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process is an annual collection of information about Australian school students who have adjustments due to their disability. The Student Services team here at CPSSC have been working hard to ensure that all information available in the school accurately reflects the frequency and intensity of adjustments made to support the learning needs of students with disability.

Information provided to the Federal government for the NCCD includes:

- Year of schooling
- Category of disability cognitive, physical, sensory or social/emotional
- The level of adjustment provided for the student support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, or supplementary, substantial or extensive levels of adjustment.

The NCCD enables schools, education authorities and governments to better understand the needs of students with disability and how they can be best supported at school. Please note that while data is collected at a school level, personal details such as student names or student identifiers are not provided to Federal education authorities as part of the NCCD.

In Mathematics, students explored the fascinating world of probability and statistics. They learned how to collect and analyse data, represent it using different graphs, and interpret patterns to make informed predictions. These skills will support their future learning and build a strong foundation for real-world applications of mathematics.

In Science, we celebrated Science Week with the theme "Decoding the Universe". Students participated in a range of hands-on activities, including:

- Investigating the colour of stars using spectroscopes
- Extracting DNA from strawberries in a fun and messy experiment
- Testing their knowledge in a fast-paced Periodic Table Bingo challenge





Throughout the term, Year 7 students have been delving into the world of physics, investigating different types of forces and their effects. In Week 10, they will showcase their understanding by designing and racing balloon-powered cars, combining scientific knowledge with creativity and problem-solving skills.

Meanwhile, Year 8 students have been developing their understanding of chemistry, learning to distinguish between physical change and chemical change. They have been honing their laboratory skills while experimenting with various substances to observe and analyse physical and chemical properties in action.

It has been inspiring to see our students challenging themselves, collaborating with peers, and embracing the wonders of science and mathematics this term.


If your teacher asks, you must act!

Our Year 7 Art students have had a busy and creative start to the year, focusing on the elements of art.

Students began the term exploring colour, learning how to create focal points and contrast. They produced beautiful title pages using coloured pencil skills to demonstrate blending, shading, and strong visual impact.

Next, the focus moved to line, where students developed control and variety through detailed line drawings. This task encouraged students to experiment with different types of lines to create rhythm, movement, and contrast in their artworks. Currently, students are learning about shape and form. In 3D, they are developing their skills through a clay project, exploring how shape becomes form when working with sculpture. In 2D, students are discovering the Japanese-inspired art of the Notan, where they use positive and negative space to create striking designs of shapes.



It has been wonderful to see the enthusiasm and creativity in the art room. We look forward to sharing more of the students' artwork as their skills and confidence continue to grow throughout the

year.


